Borys Hrinchenko

Dr. Hrinchenko earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at New York University, graduating *magna cum laude*. He subsequently attended the University of Kansas at Lawrence and obtained a PhD in organic chemistry. He then pursued postdoctoral research at the University of Chicago. Afterwards, he was employed as a research chemist in industry. Following much soul searching, Dr. Hrinchenko decided to pursue a career in medicine and was accepted to the State University of New York at Downstate. He completed his internship and residency in internal medicine at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. This was followed by a hematology and oncology fellowship at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. He continued for an additional two years as a research associate at the NIH in the Molecular Medicine Branch under the mentorship of Dr. Alan Schechter. Dr. Hrinchenko was appointed to faculty positions at the University of Alabama at Birmingham and subsequently at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland. He has been a faculty member in the College of Human Medicine at MSU for the past 10 years. Dr. Hrinchenko has collaborated closely with scientists interested in basic cancer research, which has led to grant funding and patent applications. He has successfully obtained over a million dollars in grant funding for cancer clinical trials at MSU. In addition, he was the co-director of the MSU and McLaren Great Lakes Cancer Institute. He also has a passion for mentoring students in clinical research. Currently, he is the director of the combined McLaren and MSU Hematology and Oncology Fellowship program. He was also elected as a fellow to the Royal Society of Medicine and to the Alpha Omega Alpha medical honor society. Dr. Hrinchenko serves on the steering committee of the Big Ten Cancer Research Consortium and also on the College of Human Medicine Faculty Advisory and Executive committees. Dr. Hrinchenko and Helena, his wife of 27 years, have one son, Nicholas, who is a graduate of MSU. In his spare time, Dr. Hrinchenko likes to travel, play chess, watch classic movies, and spend time with his family and friends.

Rui Nui-Cooper

Dr. Rui Nui-Cooper is an associate professor and the director of the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) and English as a Second Language (ESL) programs in the Grand Valley State University (GVSU) College of Education. She was a director of the ESL and bilingual programs at Aquinas College for more than six years before she moved to GVSU. Dr. Nui-Cooper earned her Ph.D. from Michigan State University in teacher education with a concentration of English as a second language, English as a foreign language, and foreign language teaching. Dr. Nui-Cooper has won multiple awards from MSU and Aquinas, including the Dean's Scholarship, College Research Fund, and graduate student award. In 2016, Dr. Cooper was awarded a \$2.53 million U.S. federal grant to work with ESL teachers

— INVITED PRESENTATION —

James Forger

James B. Forger is Professor and Dean of the College of Music at Michigan State University. Prior to his current appointment, he was a member of the faculty of East Carolina University.

Dean Forger has performed widely throughout South America, Europe, Asia, and the former Soviet Union, and has been active as a saxophone soloist, appearing with orchestras such as the Pittsburgh Symphony, Warsaw Philharmonic, Grand Teton Music Festival Orchestra, and Grand Rapids Symphony, as well as recent concerts in Cuba, China, India, and Uzbekistan. He has commissioned and recorded a number of new works. Recent interests and initiatives have included those related to music and social justice, musical entrepreneurship, and music for special populations.

Forger is the founder of two community music schools in East Lansing and Detroit that currently serve, on an annual basis, a diverse population of approximately 5,000, seeking to provide access to the power of music regardless of economic barriers. He joined the MSU faculty as assistant professor of saxophone in 1979. He became director of the School of Music in 1990, and then dean when Music became MSU's 17th college in 2007. During his tenure as dean, new programs, including ethnomusicology, early childhood music education, and jazz studies, were initiated.

He is active in the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM), where he has served as a member of the Commission on Accreditation, is currently chair of the Accrediting Commission for Community and Precollegiate Arts Schools (ACCPAS) Commission on Non-Degree Granting Accreditation, and has chaired numerous accreditation visits across the United States.

Dean Forger earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees at the University of Michigan.

Deborah Moriarty

Deborah Moriarty is professor of piano and chair of the piano area at the Michigan State University College of Music, where she is a recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award. A Massachusetts native, she made her debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra at age 11. She has also served on the piano faculty at the New England Conservatory of Music and the University of Lowell. Moriarty attended the Curtis Institute of Music, the Juilliard School, and the New England Conservatory of Music, where she received her master of music degree with honors. She has studied with Russell Sherman, Theodore Lettvin, and Beveridge Webster. An active recitalist and soloist with orchestras throughout the eastern United States, she has also performed in Belgium, Japan, Colombia, Mexico, and the Soviet Union. Moriarty is a founding member of the Fontana Ensemble of Michigan, and as an advocate of new music, has participated in numerous premiere performances including Milton Babbitt's "Whirled Series" at Merkin Hall in New York City. She has recordings on the Crystal and CRI labels.

Excellence Award in Interdisciplinary Scholarship

Sustainable Community Development in Tanzania 2019

Sustainable Community Development in Tanzania (SCDT) 2019 was a six-week education abroad program offered in the College of Social Science at MSU. The Tanzania Partnership Program (TPP) of the Office of International Studies and Programs funded it. SCDT 2019 was a collaborative program between MSU and Tanzanian universities, namely University of Dar es Salaam, Sokoine University of Agriculture, and Dar es Salaam University College of Education. The faculty leader of the program was Jonathan Choti (linguistics and languages), assisted by two PhD students, Ja'La Wourman (rhetoric and writing) and Pauline Wambua (education policy). The faculty leader of the Tanzanian team was Victoria Moshy (resources assessment), assisted by Emiliana Mwita (education) and Iddi Kimera (veterinary medicine). Two graduate students in the Tanzanian team were Barakaeli Matulu and Francis Mkasiwa (resources assessment). Seven MSU and seven Tanzanian undergraduate students participated. They represented a wide range of disciplines, such as environmental economics and management, food industry management, environmental studies and sustainability, leadership and integrated learning, human development and family studies, education, global and international studies, zoology, horticulture, and veterinary medicine.

The curriculum of SCDT 2019 consisted of teaching, research, and service. Teaching included Swahili lessons, presentations, discussions, lectures, and field trips. Besides, the team helped complete a dining pavilion at Naitolia Primary School. Research activities involved four teams, i.e. Agriculture, Water Access and Safety, Education, and Energy/Environment. Each team addressed a pressing issue in Naitolia Village. The teams determined project scope, research objectives, methodology, data collection and analysis, interventions, and recommendations. Agriculture Team investigated food issues and livelihoods while Education Team examined the gap between education stakeholders (i.e. teachers, students, education officers, school committee, and parents) at Mswakini Primary School. Energy/Environment Team studied biogas production using cow dung. Water Access and Safety Team studied the impact of the rehabilitated pond and rainwater harvesting in the village.

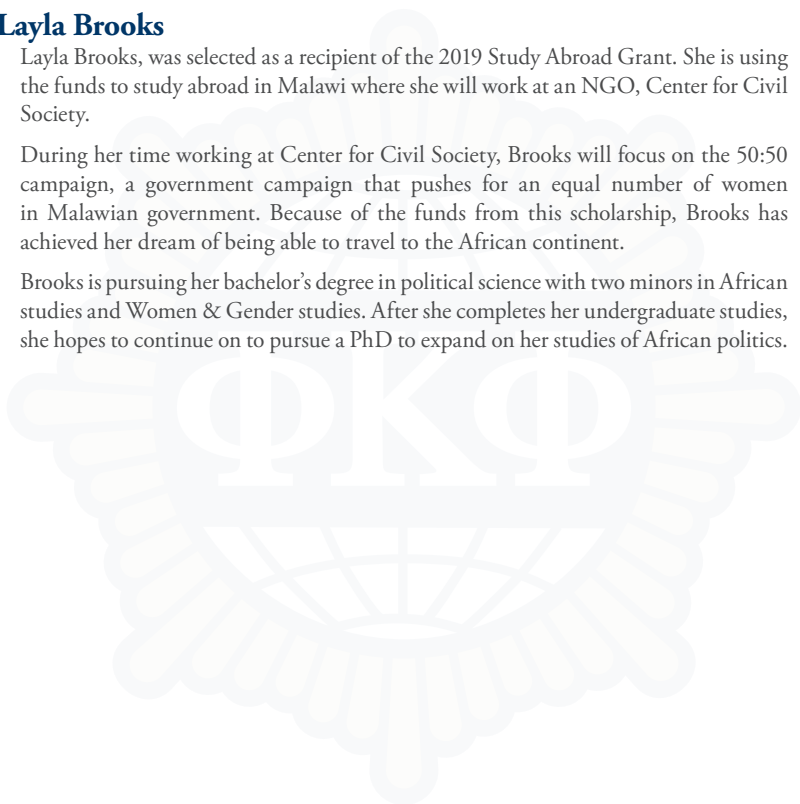
Study Abroad Grant
